# Welcome to Scouting on Hayling Island

Your child is now one of 31 million young people in 220 countries and territories who join in the fun of Scouting every week. The experiences your son or daughter has as a Scout are likely to stay with them for the rest of their lives. This guide aims to give you a better understanding of our aims and values, some important information regarding our Group and some ways in which you can help to really make a difference to the lives of young people.

## So, what's it all about?

Scouting began in 1907 with a camp for 20 boys on Brownsea Island in Dorset. There have been many changes since that first camp, but our aim remains the same: *To contribute to the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities.*

Today, over 400,000 young people take part in the fun and adventure of Scouting in the UK, and each week over 250 young Hayling Islanders wear their Scout Uniform, supported by over 60 adults.
