

Obituaries

During the past few months, we have been saddened by the deaths of five individuals who have either been active members, or supporters, of the 3^{rd} Hayling Scouts.

Gillian Scarffe was linked to the Group in three ways. Her father Major Gunnell founded the Group in 1929 and like the children of most adults in Scouting she found herself joining in with many Scouting camps and activities. During the 1980s and 1990s she became Assistant Cub Leader with Jupiter Pack and, having stepped down from active Scouting, became one of our strongest supporters and ambassadors. Her sudden death last year was a shock to us all.

John Scarffe, Gillian's husband was always being volunteered to help us or join in with our various events. Although never directly involved in the movement as an adult, John was a great friend of Scouting and was always so positive about what was being done to help the young people of today. John passed away very recently.

Phil Ford grew up as part of a Scouting family. His own Scouting was not on Hayling but mainly in Havant. However when Venture Scouting was introduced to the 3rd Hayling Scouts, Phil undertook the task of establishing this new section for the 16-20 age range, a task he achieved with terrific results. Many of his "old" Venture Scouts remain active n the movement today, as Leaders, members of Executive Committees or as very supportive parents. Phil had been unwell for some time but could often be found supporting Jane with her Guides.

Ro Dobner was the mother of three boys, all of whom enjoyed time in the Group. It was when the youngest joined Beavers that Ro donned our uniform as a Beaver Scout Leader. The experience of seeing what her own children had done placed her in an ideal position to talk about the benefits of Scouting to others something she did with great enthusiasm.

Chris Hunt was never a Leader with Hayling Scouts but someone who always said that what he saw on Hayling was what he would like to achieve with his own Troop in Leigh Park. He was known to many young people of Hayling in his capacity as Swimming Coach in Waterlooville and developed a great rapport with all ages. Chris was just 44 when he died.

We are extremely grateful for everything Gillian, John, Phil, Ro and Chris have done to support us, and our prayers and thoughts continue to be with their families.

Chairman's Report

After last year's massive fundraising effort to replace the roof of our Headquarters, this year we have been able to focus our attention on the Centenary of Scouting 2007. It is amazing that the inspirational ideas of one man, Lord Baden-Powell, are still valid one hundred years later. This is especially so on Hayling Island where Scouting grows from strength to strength. Many of the activities enjoyed today by our own young people, such as camping in the great outdoors, are those of the original Scouts.

We are playing our full part in the Centenary celebrations, both locally and further afield, to reinforce the Scouting ideals.



Two of our Scouts, Alistair Harris and Jorden Reed, will be attending the World Jamboree in July and they will experience the true spirit of Scouting on an international scale, and we wish them well.

Our Scout Group is proud of the links we have established within our local community and this year we have continued to develop these links by extending our sponsorship programme. What do we mean by sponsorship? Many people think simply in financial terms and we are, of course, always grateful for that type of help. However, we also see it as a way for individuals and organisations to endorse our aims and objectives and become involved in our work with the youth of the Island.

To this end, we have embarked on a programme of badge sponsorship and have been delighted with the response and enthusiasm shown by many individuals and organisations. This is vividly demonstrated on page 3 of this Annual Report, where you will see eleven organisations sponsoring a total of twenty-nine badges. Committee member Sam Mill has been the driving force behind this scheme, with support from fellow member Nigel Kenny as Badge Secretary.

We appreciate the generosity of all who have given us donations, which help to keep our subscriptions low and make Scouting accessible to all. Two examples are: a donation from ACE (Association for Charitable Endeavours) for the purchase of a new Explorer flag, and one from Irene Day for the new windows in our Scout Headquarters.

I was particularly delighted that two of our Explorer Scouts received their Queen's Scout Awards - a fantastic achievement, and our first for fifteen years. We should all feel proud of Robert Venus and Alan Oakes, and proud, too, of everyone who helped them to fulfil this achievement.

I am fortunate, as Chairman of the Group, to have on my Committee a team of enthusiastic people, and this year we welcomed three new members, Graham Chapman, Gill Condron and Helen Pickles. Our Group Committee has a wide remit with responsibility for the management and development of the Group, and Graham, Gill and Helen are already making a significant input to our busy programme.



Our exciting new Five-Year Plan 'Looking Outwards' was developed this year, incorporating four main themes: accessibility, support, education and promotion. Details can be seen on page 42 along with the achievements of our previous plan 'Beyond 2002', on page 41.

Finally, I cannot fail to mention Ian Hawke's wonderful efforts in creating and maintaining a fantastic website for the Group. It forms the backbone of our communication both within and beyond 3^{rd} Hayling, and I know that we will be seeing some exciting developments of the website in the near future. Well done, Ian, for this and for the enthusiasm you bring to all our activities in the Group.

My thanks go to everyone for maintaining a successful Scout Group on Hayling.

Group Scout Leader's Report

Scouting is a team game. If you look at any successful Scout Group (or other youth organisation), you will see a team of people offering different skills but all with one common goal - "To help young people achieve".

In our team we have:

- 160 plus young people (aged 6 to 18) who wear our uniform every week.
- 25 adults who each week organise and run meetings & activities
- 12 adults, our Group Development Team, who provide the facilities, equipment and funds to allow the uniformed sections to operate.
- 40 plus adults who take on specific roles such as organising or helping with events/activities, helping Leaders with administration such as Subs collection, cutting the grass, sorting out Gift Aid etc.
- 300 plus parents who get involved in transporting their children to meetings & activities and of course pay subscriptions and camp fees!
- Local individuals, organisations and businesses who help us with funds, equipment, sponsorship, activities or by endorsing our goal.

This is a big team, but then again I cannot think of any other single organisation on Hayling Island that is supporting so many young people with so many different activities.

And they all do it for free!

I feel very privileged to be the custodian of this team and would like to say a very big THANK YOU to everyone who helps in whatever way.

It is vital for our success and that of Scouting that we continue to evolve and progress. Our last five year plan, "Beyond 2002" has now completed (see elsewhere in this report) and this year we have launched "Looking Outwards" for the next five years. With Scouting celebrating 100 years this year, you will already have seen (hopefully) the increased publicity for our movement through Radio, Television, Newspapers and other media. It is our collective duty to capitalise on this and once again make Scouting truly fashionable the slogan we have adopted for "Looking Outwards". So what have our Leaders achieved this year?

- Over 1,000 nights spent in camp across the Group
- 40 members of the Group achieved a top award for their section
- 300 Activity and Challenge Badges have been presented
- 2 Explorers, Robert Venus and Alan Oakes, were presented with their Queen's Scout Awards our first for 15 years.
- Our "Siege of Lyons Copse" Group Camp last June was fantastic (or should I say "Awesome"). Over 100 people camping and the main event, "the siege" is still talked about 1 year later!
- Summer Camps in Devon for the Scouts including rifle shooting, archery, kayaking plus the normal Scouting activities of cooking, hikes, wide games, swimming etc.
- Our Explorers went to the Lake District for a week of Climbing, Hill Walking, Gorge Walking, Quad Biking, Dragon Boating plus lots more.
- Cubs from both Packs joined in a special 90th Birthday Camp on Hayling having a great time and cutting and eating a special Birthday Cake cooked by Sharon Ashley - thanks, Sharon.
- Otter Patrol from Lion Troop are 7th best Patrol in Hampshire for Camping Skills, having previously won the District Gunnell Trophy.
- Eagle Troop beat Lion Troop in the final of the District Football, whilst Jupiter Pack returned home with the Cub Football Trophy.
- Community Service remains a key part of Scout life. During the year many individuals will be found helping others whilst other community activities include:
 - Scouts helping at the Hayling Island Businessmen's club BBQ
 - Explorers clearing rhododendrons from a campsite in West Sussex
 - Lion Troop maintaining their annual camp fire cleaning
 - Cubs from Saturn Pack organised and held a bring and buy sale for an orphanage in Ghana
 - Redwood Beavers sang Christmas Carols to the residents of a local Old People's Home.
 - $\circ\,$ Aspen Beavers again tackled the "Gimme 5" challenge in conjunction with the WWF.

As you read the section reports you will find lots of other activities and achievements, and also observe that whatever we do, fun is the key component. The achievements of the uniformed sections would not have been possible without the improvements to our facilities and equipment and the associated funding. You can read in other reports more details of this but I would like to mention some specific items:

"Beyond 2002" included a safety and security programme which included upgrades to our windows, doors and fencing. A special thank you goes to Irene Day for her generous donation towards the costs of these items.

The Hayling Island Flower Club chose our Group as their charity of choice for 2006. Phil Blosse and I attended their Annual Meeting and were delighted to receive a cheque for £500. This money was used to purchase of the Centenary Neckerchief now being worn by every member of the Group.

The Association of Charitable Endeavours (ACE) sponsored and presented our Explorer Unit with their own unit flag for use on special occasions and parades.

The Hayling Island Businessmen's Club invite us to help them with their annual BBQ, the work including cleaning up before and after the event, organising car parking and also to help with eating the food!. Not only is this great fun, HIBC also gave us a significant donation.

The Lions club organise the annual Langstone Harbour Sponsored Walk. This allows us to take part in a fun event and raise money towards our activities.

Page 3 of this report identifies local individuals, organisations businesses who are supporting us by becoming "badge sponsors". Sam Mill has done a superb job in gaining this support.

Whilst the money is important, what is more special to me is the endorsement of our goals and aims shown by the many people who support us. After all, it is the young people of today that will become the fundraisers and supporters of tomorrow.

I end my report with a special thank you to Phil Blosse for his continued commitment to our cause and to my own family, without whose support I would not be able to continue in this wonderful game of Scouting.

Treasurer's Report

Another very busy year in Scouting with a turnover of over £40,000. The turnover includes a significant increase in the costs of camps and activities resulting from the Centenary Celebrations. (These are identified under "Money exchange, camps and trips").

We have received very generous donations, and therefore an increase in Gift Aid, together with great fundraising efforts by many people (the Quiz raised nearly £600 and the Book Sales over £1,400) have ensured a healthy balance at year end.

We have paid back our loan from Havant District and put \pounds 2,000 in our Scout Development Fund, and the accounts show a small surplus of \pounds 663.

Additionally, this year we purchased 200 Centenary Neckerchiefs so that every member of the Group could wear them as we enjoy our 100^{th} birthday. The cost of these (£1,505) was covered by the Christmas Post and the generous donation from the Hayling Island Flower Club.

Again this year, the Explorer Scouts are currently District-based and their accounts have to be included with Havant District. To simplify the accounting, it is shown on our Accounts as a deduction on income, for their subscriptions, and a deduction on expenditure of the same amount for capitation and use of facilities.

My thanks again go to Chris Driscoll for auditing our accounts. These accounts are un-audited, as this time of year both Chris and myself are extremely busy, but I am sure the draft represents a true summary of our financial affairs.

We began the new term with some archery, followed by making cakes and a card for Fathers day. Hayling Scouts was going to have a fun weekend this year and we spent the next week making the targets for the catapult base. We made big cardboard cut outs of Disney villains and the Beavers painted them. They made such a lovely job of them that we only used one of them in the end to fire the catapults at!



The Great Siege Of Lyons Copse, a medieval battle, took place on a sunny



June weekend. The Beavers went for the day and what an exciting day they had! They spent the making morning their armour and weapons, doing target practise with catapults and

archery, building go-carts and generally running around doing what Beavers do best - making immense amounts of noise! The big battle was staged in the afternoon and the Beavers got to try out all their new skills - firing sponges loaded with paint and water, throwing flour bombs and making even more noise - at the Explorer Scouts who were holding the fort. Everyone got thoroughly wet and pasted! The day was finished with lots of food and a campfire.

Returning to normality - if that's what we can call the everyday Beaver meeting - we learnt about Aspen trees, made a Hayling Scouts Family Tree and threw in some biscuit decorating for good measure. Beaver Scouting was 20 years old in 2006 and we had a lovely time going to the Havant District Beaver Birthday Party to celebrate with about 40 Beavers from across the Havant District. A Better Place to Play




Bring a friend evening.


time. I was very proud of them all for their "awesome stickability".

He has organised 25 sales, sorted in excess of 75,000 books and raised over £14,000 in the past thirteen years. Without Mark's dedication the sales would



not have achieved their well-deserved reputation. Chairman Philip Blosse presented Mark with an engraved goblet in thanks. These hugely successful events will continue with the help of our dedicated sales team.

In 2006 we supported the Hayling Carnival again by running a Crockery-Smashing Stall, which was a great hit! Much frustration was vented by a large number of people and over £250 was added to our funds.

Following last year's successful Indian Supper Evening, the Desai family again offered to cook some traditional dishes much enjoyed by the 55 people who attended. The evening was organised by Ciara Jamieson-Goode, with help on the night from Explorer Scouts Shona, Kathryn, Zack and Joe, and Clive Allgood who organised a quiz. Our thanks go to all of them. £350 was raised towards our Centenary celebrations.

Once again, members of the Group joined in with the Round Langstone Walk. Beavers, Cubs, Leaders and Parents braved very wet and windy conditions to walk along the Billy Trail to the North Hayling Halt and back again, whilst the Scouts, Explorers and Leaders completed the full 15 miles with two traditional Scout Trek Carts in tow. Sponsorship for our members who took part in the Round Langstone Walk totalled nearly £500. Well done to everyone and our thanks to those of you who sponsored our intrepid wet weather walkers!

In July, the Scouts and Explorers were invited to help again with the Hayling Island Businessmen's Club annual BBQ, helping with the setting up, car parking, and clearing away. For this support we received a donation.

The 100 Club, initiated the previous year for the Raise the Roof Campaign, was continued and made a profit of ± 350 .

Over 150 joined in our Annual Quiz Night raising £600 for the Group Safety and Security Project. Winners of the quiz for the fifth time were ACE. Many thanks to Mandy Hawke and Fiona Jordan Harrison for organising the event, and to our resident quizmaster Billy Ault, former Leader with the Group, and Ann & Eddie Ault who acted as markers and scorers.

Our 25th consecutive Christmas Post raised nearly £1,000 with the delivery of over 6,000 cards. Our Explorers worked hard to complete the sorting in five hours. The profit was put towards the special Centenary neckerchiefs given to every member of the Group. Many thanks to everyone who helped us to sort and deliver the cards.

Chairman's Welcome

Approximately 70 people attended, and the Chairman was glad to welcome so many guests and supporters of Hayling Scouts in view of the fact that the FIFA World Cup was currently being televised, and thankful the England team was not playing this evening.

Thanks were expressed to John Clayton of Bishops for printing this year's Report. Included with the Report was the latest edition of 3^{rd} Hayling's newsletter, *The Woggle*, and forms for joining the 100 Club. The Chairman congratulated the Leaders on their section reports and invited the Treasurer Mary Pike to comment on her report. Mary spoke of the amazing year with regard to fundraising for the new roof and was pleased the year had ended with a small surplus. The Chairman added that a £2,000 loan from Havant Scout Council had still to be taken into account, but thanked Mary for her hard work.

The Chairman expressed his gratitude to all who had made donations towards the cost of the roof, many of whom were present at this meeting. The work had been completed on time and within budget, and all members of the Group had benefited from spending their winter meetings in a warm and dry headquarters. To complement the roof, new front doors had been fitted and the perimeter fence had been replaced. The Chairman spoke of his pride in what had been achieved over the past year, particular mention being made of the Group's website (www.haylingscouts.org.uk) set up by Group Scout Leader Ian Hawke, and the Chairman gave a live demonstration of what information was available on our current website (also a commercial for the Hayling Flower Club coffee morning next Saturday, a donation from the proceeds of which is to be made to 3rd Hayling Scouts). Following the Group's policy since 1992 of having a five-year plan, the most recent of which began with "Beyond 2002", work is currently in progress to produce the next plan and this will be announced in 2007.

Group Scout Leader's Report

Ian Hawke thanked guests for attending, and in particular the Leaders who, for at least 44 weeks of each year, freely give their time for the love of Scouting. Ian also emphasised that the Group could not exist without the help and support of the Chairman and Executive Committee for which he was grateful. On average it costs the Group £136 per member per annum. Subscriptions contribute £66; Gift Aid £2,000; the Quiz £1,000; Christmas Post (now in its 25^{th} year) £1,000; Book Sales £1,600; other contributions this year included the proceeds from a Curry Evening and a crockery smashing stall at the Carnival. Ways of minimising the Group's costs are being explored, for example an agreement had been reached with Mill Rythe Holiday Village for them to sponsor the cost of providing some of the badges (e.g. cooking and life-saving). Raising the profile of the Group within the community was also important and the possibility of links on websites are being explored for supporters to show their endorsement of 3^{rd} Hayling Scouts.

Ian reported that every week on Hayling 160 youngsters aged between 6 and 18 put on their Scout uniform to attend meetings. In 2007 one hundred years of Scouting will be celebrated and England will be hosting the World Jamboree, to which two 3rd Hayling Scouts have been invited. All members of the Scouting movement nationwide will have the opportunity to join in the celebration of 100 years of Scouting. Ian quoted statistics of 420,000 Scout members in the UK, 216 countries belong to the Scout movement, and just 5 countries with no recognised Scouting. All this stemmed from the initial camp on Brownsea Island with a small group of boys led by Lord Baden-Powell in 1907. Also to be held in 2007 will be the Hampshire Jamboree, organised by 3rd Hayling Explorer Leader Dominic Howell with help from Tom Lincoln, and Steve Whitcombe, District Explorer Leader.

Other points Ian made were that:

- 6 of the current Leaders in the Group were aged under 30
- all but 3 of the Executive Committee were parents of current members (with apologies to Ed Harrison, aged 20, who is quoted in the Report as being a parent representative Ian wished to make it clear that Ed is NOT yet a parent)
- 3rd Hayling this year enrolled their first female Beaver, and will soon be enrolling their first female Cub

• a group for those aged 18-25 is soon to be formed

Committee Nominations 2006-2007

Ian Hawke paid tribute to the leadership of Dr Blosse as Chairman and thanked him for agreeing to continue as Chairman for the forthcoming year. Further nominations for the committee included Mary Pike Treasurer, Pete Goddard Quartermaster, Ciara Jamieson-Goode, Jo Hawley, Clive Allgood, Nigel Kenny, Samantha Mill, Peter Rowson and Graham Chapman. Nominations were proposed by Carolyn Wager and seconded by Andrew Harrison. The Chairman welcomed Graham Chapman, the new member of the Executive Committee.

Awards and Presentations

The Chairman presented a plaque in recognition of everyone who had supported the Raise the Roof Appeal.

The Fred Rook Award for Service to the Community was presented to Explorer Charles Harrison.

The David Baker Memorial Award for Commitment to the Scout Laws was presented to Leader Clare Ashley.

Engraved glass goblets were presented to **Carolyn Wager** for her work on the Executive Committee and **Lorraine Haskell** (in absentia) for her work as Secretary, both of whom had stepped down from the Committee but had agreed to continue to work with the Book Sales Team.

Alan Perfett and (in absentia) Trevor Burden were presented with engraved glass goblets in appreciation of their work on the Book Sales.

Terry Brinnen was made an honorary member of Nexus Explorers for his weekly help with the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and was presented with a Nexus shirt by Explorer Charles Harrison.

2007 World Jamboree

Scouts Jordan Reed and Alistair Harris described the extensive procedure by which they were selected to represent 3^{rd} Hayling as part of the Hampshire contingent of 72 Scouts at next year's World Jamboree, and emphasised how lucky they felt to be given such a wonderful opportunity. Jordan and Alistair then outlined the ways in which they will each raise the sum of £1,000 plus a further £200 contribution towards the cost of sending to the Jamboree a Scout from a less-affluent country.

Expedition to Nepal and Himalayas

Explorer Scout Karl Zillman gave an illustrated presentation of his memorable 8week expedition in 2005 to Nepal and the Himalayas with nine fellow Explorers from Hampshire. Karl described their training for altitude, the journey to Nepal, the community service undertaken (painting of school buildings) and the trek to Everest base camp, which culminated in the successful climbing of Island Peak at over 20,000ft. (6,189m). At 16 years old, he was one of the youngest ever to achieve this remarkable feat.

At the conclusion of the meeting the Chairman thanked everyone present for their continued support and invited them to refreshments.
