



Chairman's Review

A Sense of Adventure

Our Chief Scout, Bear Grylls, regularly uses the word 'Adventure' whenever he tries to describe the appeal of Scouting to the youth of today. We may interpret 'Adventure' as ambitious hikes over challenging terrain carrying overnight camping gear – or perhaps being part of an expedition overseas such as our Explorer Scouts' expedition to Kandersteg in Switzerland in July 2013.

For many of our Scouts, however, even the more basic activities present a form of adventure. Mixing flour and water into a sticky dough and cooking it over a smoky fire with eyes streaming is a surprisingly popular activity and a new experience for many. More surprisingly, they will then eat their burnt offering with relish - yet refuse to eat more appetising food at home cooked by their parents!



As they progress through Scouting, they may have to prepare their own menu and then go shopping on a fixed budget to select and purchase their items – a challenge that many will not have experienced before. At the same time, they will also learn the realities of the cost of different foods and how to manage their allocated budget.

Some form of leadership role, such as a Sixer in Cubs or a Patrol Leader in Scouts, can be a significant 'adventure' and a challenge at such a young age – taking responsibility for a team, and learning the essential skills of managing activities and people. When they succeed, they then appreciate the personal satisfaction and reward of a job well done.

These activities are the often unrealised or 'hidden' benefits of Scouting today. You only have to read our Annual Report to see the amazing range of 'adventures', some simple and some quite bizarre, created by our Leaders.

For me, these activities generate the buzz that I get from my involvement with the 3rd Hayling Scout Group. As Chairman, I don't have to endure the perils of camping under canvas in pouring rain or take part in a hike in sweltering or freezing temperatures. My satisfaction comes from being part of a Group Development Team (GDT) whose purpose is to provide the essential support for our Leaders, so that they can create the adventures and challenges of Scouting.

As a team, we try to project our requirements in a 5 year plan but in the 3rd Hayling Scout Group, life is not always very predictable. In our plan 'Looking Outwards,' created in 2007, we did not expect membership numbers to increase significantly and defined our resource requirements accordingly. In fact, we grew at 10% per year and had to open new Sections. As a result, we ran out of space for Section meetings and had to use School Halls to meet the demand, a contingency of great help but not ideal. Eventually we took the major decision in 2012 to create a new hall in the HQ by merging two rooms, using the legacy from Irene Day to fund the project - and we have named the hall 'The Day Hall'. I think Irene would be proud of this smart, new facility which incorporates features not normally found in Scout 'huts', such as LED lighting, controllable high-output heating and good thermal insulation.

There was another necessary deviation from our 5 year plan concerning transport requirements. We launched a fundraising appeal for a Transit van for transporting equipment and goods to camps and activities. The appeal raised \pounds 8,000 and we thank all those organisations, retailers and individuals who helped



to raise this sum in just over one year. It became apparent during this appeal that the insurance costs, driving restrictions and maintenance costs of a van did not compare favourably with hiring, when required, a van of suitable size. We therefore redefined our needs. With part of the fund, we were able to purchase an additional trailer. The fund has also been used to pay for professional training and testing of Leaders or helpers who did not have the class E entitlement on their driving licence – an essential legal requirement for towing heavier trailers and loads. The fund will also cover on-going costs of servicing, repair and maintenance of our trailers.

What about the future?

Now we have the challenge of trying to predict what will happen over the next 5 years and how to plan the resources accordingly. We do not anticipate the need for major developments in or around the headquarters (possibly famous last words?) We are the largest Scout Group in Hampshire with a membership of 250 and a turnover typically in excess of £50,000. The Scout Association requires our accounts to be audited annually and, as a registered charity, we also have to submit a report and accounts to the Charities Commission every year. We therefore have to manage our organisation like a business and ensure that our management structure continues to evolve to meet current and future requirements. It is the job of my Group Development Team to structure and plan accordingly.

We have already established good relationships with many of the local Schools and we wish to extend this involvement, as we all have the shared objective to train, educate and assist the development of our young people. We also maintain good relationships with many local organisations, businesses, churches etc. and aim to develop our involvements further as part of our service and contribution to the local community.

Compared to many Scout Groups, our subscriptions per term are quite low, enabling children from families on limited income to benefit from Scouting. To achieve this, we have to raise income from other sources such as fundraising, gift aid, sponsorship and grants. This financial commitment to keeping subscriptions low means that we will have to continually appraise the most suitable ways of generating income, ideally without placing demands on Leaders' time.

Finally, I would like to thank members of my Group Development Team for their hard work throughout the year and we look forward to supporting the Scout Group through another successful year.

Group Scout Leader's Review

In any one year there are great moments and those a little less positive but always plenty of change and the past year has been no different. Once again:-

- Over 1200 nights were spent in camp
- 36 Top Awards were presented along with nearly 1500 activity and challenge badges
- An ever increasing range of activities on offer across all age ranges
- Two double decker buses required to get us to the St Georges Day Service
- A brilliant fun day with some novel activities

Just take the time to read the individual section reports and I am sure that like me you will be amazed at the innovation, inspiration and imagination of the Leadership teams

Our numbers are slightly down this year, the first drop for 6 years. When we looked into the details it was clear that the biggest challenge was with the Scout sections. The leaders took the time to understand the possible causes and have started to put in place some minor changes that I am confident will turn this around during the next couple of years.

We also said goodbye to some of our Leaders during the year, although in most cases they did have to move away from Hayling to achieve this. Jim Simpson who joined us in 2001 and made a tremendous contribution to Lion Troop and the Group left us in September when he, Lorna (who also helped us with the Beavers) and family moved to the other side of Hampshire. They are all still involved in Scouting nearer their new home. Alistair Harris, also a leader with Lion Troop has left us for University although he still helps out when he can. Lydia Wilson, leader with Mars Pack also left us when her employment took her to Andover and more recently Diane and Dave Stanway have decided to take a break from the weekly commitment, although they will still be around to help when required.

Tom Lincoln and Jamie Bray have now taken over the reins with Lion Troop with the continued support of Merv Haines, Rob Durrell and Liam Holden when he is back from University.

One of the toughest decisions for the year was to close Scorpion Scout Troop. Dominic Howell continues to be very active in Scouting organising County events for Scouts and Alan Scutt and Tony Baker continue to provide support on Hayling. Every Scout had the opportunity to transfer to another troop and they have now settled in with their new section. I would like to thank Dominic, Tony and Alan for their great work with the Troop and the foundations they have laid for the Scouts.

Congratulations to Dominic on being awarded the Silver Acorn by the Chief Scout for his exceptional services to Scouting over many years.

We held two group activities last year. Our fun day postponed from June to September after I found two herons wading in the field, was based on an Olympic theme but with some great traditional activities supplemented with some new ones. Crate Stacking proved to be very

popular as did Pete Goddard's home grown assault course in the woods. We ended the day with all 120 young people taking part in a tug of war.

The second event was the annual "Jamboree on the Air" event when members of the movement from all over the world communicate either by Radio or the Internet. The weekend was made more fun by Jamie Bray, Tom Lincoln, other members of Dreadnought and Leaders by providing another set of activities. Over 100 came along at some point throughout the weekend to wade through the puddles and communicate with Scouts across the world. Thanks to Robert Bond for hosting both of these events and to Pete Willingham for giving up his time to run the Radio station.

In addition to the weekly section programmes there are District and County events some for fun and others competitive. It is great to see all of our sections taking part in many of these. Well done to Saturn Pack on winning the District Cub Football event and to Eagle Troop for winning the trophy for composite patrols at the District Camping competition and also for winning the Observation event at the County camping competition.

What was really pleasing was to see our new Hall in use from January. The planning started in November 2011 with Pete Rowson and Sean Lambert leading a requirements and design exercise to identify how best to use the existing space to provide a second meeting hall. Planning permission seemed to take forever but eventually we received the "go ahead" and in September 2012 Keith Hellyer and his company C&G contractors started to pull down walls, remove part of the roof and start the rebuilding exercise. Although the plaster took ages and lots of warm air to dry, by Christmas the major work was complete including lighting, heating and new flooring. Although we had a few hiccups along the way and of course a few changes, the new hall is now in full use and looking great!

Of course one of the problems of combining two rooms and a hallway is the loss of storage and Pete Goddard, Jamie MacCallum and Andrew Harrison have done a tremendous job in providing extra storage through the building of boxes, cupboards and increased shelving in various parts of the HQ. There are still a number of projects to complete of course!!

A big thank you to Andrew Harrison as well for building new trestle tables that will be used at camps. We used to have 6 trestle tables with separate wooden legs and in the past year the Scout Leaders have come to recognise the benefit of these. We spent hours searching the Internet and ebay for these to no avail so maybe there is a possible future business opportunity for Andrew!

We have also decided to incorporate a permanent Air Rifle shooting range in the new hall and Pete Goddard has been using his design skills along with Jamie and Tom two of our qualified instructors to make it easier for them to run this activity in the future.

Underpinning all of the work of the Leaders is our Group Development Team led by Phil Blosse. It is easy to say that their role is to ensure that the Leadership have the equipment and facilities they require to deliver fun Scouting, but of course this covers a diverse range of activity. Fund Raising, promotion, maintenance, planning and innovation are all part of the combined characteristics from this small but willing team of people and I know that their efforts and successes are well respected by the Leaders, so on everyone's behalf a huge thank you to you all. A special mention to Jo Hawley who stood down from this team after many years. Thank you Jo for all your help and support. I would like to welcome Nicola Jenner onto this team and she is already making a difference.

So, what about the next 12 months?

Our number one priority will continue to provide safe exciting Scouting that offers a good balance of fun and achievement to the Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers in the group. To achieve this we always have to look at what we offer and what we can offer. This places demands on our Leaders and also our Group Development Team and therefore we need to ensure we remain totally flexible and to utilise the skills and time people have to offer. This in turn will have an impact on what we can do, the timeframe in which we can do it and what financial support is required.

I have already mentioned that we have further improvement projects underway and others on our "to do" list and I want to increase the number of people who are able to support these projects and therefore reducing the dependency on the few currently involved.

It is for this reason that we are increasing our emphasis on our Service Crew which will help reduce the demands on the Leaders and provide a significant benefit to all of us involved with the 3rd Hayling Scout Group. (See the next page!).

22 Explorers and Leaders are getting very excited about their expedition to Switzerland in July and I would like to thank Kerry & Darren Rocket, Sam Mill and Colin Reed for their hard work in coordinating fund raising events to help offset the cost.

Finally, I would like to say a huge thank you to our Chairman Phil Blosse for his tireless efforts in moving the group forward and especially to Mandy who puts up with my endless visits to the HQ, or Phil or wherever this great movement takes me.

On average our Leaders spend 3 hours a week giving freely of their time for the young people of Hayling Island. If every parent could give 3 hours a year, we could achieve everything we need, to support our Leaders. How will you give your 3 hours?

Treasurer's Report

Income for the year totalled £45,000 up by £10000 mainly due to the income and fundraising by the Explorer Scouts for their Summer 2013 expedition to Switzerland. This is shown in the accounts under the "Money Exchange, camps and trips" line items.

Our objective is that the income from subscriptions should cover the cost of the annual capitation to Scouting HQ, section running costs, books & badges, Leader training and specialist equipment and 75% of the HQ costs (Insurance, Utilities and Maintenance). The increase in subscriptions from April 2012 has enabled us to achieve this objective.

The period from September 2012 to March 2013 was a period of major expenditure, following the decision to create a new hall in the HQ to enable all section meetings to take place at the HQ. The Irene Day legacy funded the majority of the improvements although the General fund was required to cover some of the additional items.

Removing the income from the Suisse 2013 expedition and the significant expenditure on the HQ improvements, our income and expenditure balanced.

There remain a number of improvement projects to be completed in the next 12 months so our regular fund raising will be key to maintain our financial stability.

Fortunately the hard work of many with our Book Sales, Quiz, 100 Club and Xmas Post continue to make $\pounds4000$ profit for the group. It is, as a direct result of these events and other generous donations that our annual subscription at $\pounds90$ remain below that of many other groups and well below that for many other organisations and hobbies.

My thanks to Karen Wells for managing the subscriptions across the group and to Kim Lovegrove for dealing with Gift Aid and to Chris Driscoll for auditing our accounts. At this time, these accounts are unaudited, but I am sure the draft represents a true summary of our financial affairs.

Aspen Beaver Colony

The best moments of the last year have been the simple things. Those moments when Beavers find (often unplanned) activities with minimal preparation, organisation or leadership.

In the year since last May Aspen Beavers have had the weekly opportunity to take part in a variety of activities, plus additional Aspen, Group and District events. I know the Beavers have enjoyed the variety and challenge because they come and tell me.

Many of these experiences are leading them towards Challenge Badges. These include Promise, Health, Faith and Creativity. Completing these has lead to many of our Beavers gaining the Bronze award, the top Beaver award. Congratulations to Noah Cruickshank, Alex Graham and Max Trueman.

My focus is on providing group play, challenge, cooperation and sharing. So what highlights this since the last award ceremony?

We took a mini bus of Beavers away to Ferny Crofts in the New Forest. The day was themed around the Outdoor Challenge Badge. With organised orienteering, adventure course and climbing tower.



We had the sunny day, there were deep puddles from previous rain fall - these offered an activity in themselves. The shallower puddles provided opportunities for sticks and stirring up mud.

One larger puddle with a rope swing provided opportunities for wet Beavers and stirring up mud.

Most of the wild life disappeared as the Beavers turned up, except for the dead squirrel - a cause of great excitement. Overall a day of boundless energy.

Jacko provided an Archery evening - excellent practice at listening (Jacko is meticulous on safety) and then following through with the activity. He ran a further archery session over 2 meeting in the Spring term.

The Young Leaders organised an evening and the following week ran wide games at Copse Meadow Farm. The Beavers followed a trail through the woods - a bit like our very own bear hunt - but with mosquitoes instead!

The District organised Beaver Olympics - a bright sunny day if not a bit windy. An opportunity to see Beavers as more than just a local activity. They are always surprised to see friends from school. Commemorative medals were awarded.

The Autumn term:

The Group Funday (themed around sports from long ago) mixed the Beavers with the other sections. And the sun shone on us yet again.

Farm visit, the popular tractor and trailer ride to meet the cows. A tour of the milking parlour. A video of how the delicious Northney Ice Cream is made and the obligatory tasting.

For Halloween we had a spiders evening with our very own David Attenborough (Sylvie). Some good questions and answers and a chance to hold the spiders. They were particularly interested in the skins shed by spiders. To add a craft aspect there were model spiders from black pompoms, googly eyes and pipe cleaners to make and take home.

Junk modelling (or upcycling is the new trendy name) is always a popular way for leaders to dispose of 6 months collection of interesting shaped boxes. You can never go wrong with glue, sellotape and paint as a programmed activity.

We were invited by Jennifer the Church Organist to visit St Mary's. To look around the Church building and talk about the Christmas story. All the Beavers were respectful, asked interesting questions and sang Away in a Manger accompanied by Jennifer on their new electronic organ.

The Spring term:

The Young Leaders rose to the challenge again by organising the torch game, an obstacle stalking game using the Day room. Young Leader Training Programme

We run a Young Leader Training award for our young people who want to help out with the younger sections.

The programme requires a big level of commitment from our young people. They select which section they would like to help out at and then have to attend the weekly meetings, taking on various tasks and leadership roles.

They have to be responsible for organising and leading three indoor activities and three outdoor activities. After each activity is completed they have to validate what they have learned with their section leader and the scouts in the section. They, also, have to be responsible for some organisational aspect of the section. It is expected that these Missions - as they are called - will take about one year to eighteen months to complete.

In addition to this there are eleven modules to attend. Most of these are done once a month on a Sunday evening at the Scout HQ. These modules cover first aid, safe guarding children, risk assessment, planning programmes, teaching skills and managing behaviour. As you can see a very full and comprehensive challenge that has seen some great young people who have demonstrated that they are up to the task. I have no doubts that the foundations we lay at Beavers about taking some responsibility for their selves and caring for others lays the foundation for these skills to be built on through cubs and scouts.

The section leaders have a big role to play in mentoring our Young Leaders, giving them support, encouragement, guidance and the opportunity to have a go to develop their leadership skills during the weekly meetings. I am very grateful for all they do to ensure our Young Leaders are challenged and we end up with the cream - who hopefully, one day will be our leaders!

Do Dah Days – at a Scout HQ near You!

When you stop and think of what it takes to run a scout group comprising of 250 young people every week it is quite phenomenal in terms of not just the physical resources required, but also the skills and knowledge to implement a full and varied programme that both meets the needs of and challenges those young people to achieve their badges and awards.

In the Group we now have 40 adults involved in a variety of roles all of whom along with their enthusiasm and commitment bring a variety of skills and knowledge to those roles. With the demands of a large group the challenge has been to create a forum in which adult leaders, helpers and executive members can actually meet and get to know each other and at the same time share knowledge and skills to learn from each other.

The obvious answer (for any sensible person at least) to this need was of course to create a series of "Do Da Days!" In any other organisation these would probably be called Adult Training Sessions but in Scouts we have to bear in mind the essential ingredient of having fun and also to find ways of catching the attention of busy people! The genius of Baden-Powell was to recognise that people learn best when they are having fun and are enjoying themselves and this applies to adults as well as young people - so Do Da Days is what they are!



We have had two sessions so far with the first focussing on fire lighting techniques and back woods cooking and the second on knots and simple pioneering. In the near future we will be creating our own Games Consul (unlimited players and the numbers of games only limited by imagination), and also navigation skills. We do not use evaluation forms or tests of key competencies but rather an adoption of a typical leader pose comprising of a cup of tea in one hand, and the casting of a critical eye over whether the tower has stayed up, the knots held, or the sausage cooked to perfection. If they have then all is well and dandy in Scoutland, and if not well it was somebody else's fault anyway!!

Fundraising & Financial Support

Subscriptions from parents cover only one third of our costs so we are heavily dependent on fundraising and other sources of income. This year, fundraising activities, donations, grants and other sources of income have continued to provide an important supplement to our basic income from subscriptions.



The Christmas Card Delivery Service continues to be well supported and appreciated

by the local community. This year we delivered over 5,000 cards, which raised nearly £1,000. Thanks to the Explorers who sorted the cards, to the shops and locations that sold our special stamps and installed our green and yellow post boxes, to many parents and their children who delivered the cards and to our 'postmaster' Ian Hawke.

Similarly, the Quiz Night proved to be very popular again and raised £800. Thanks to Mandy Hawke for organising the event, to our markers and scorers, Eddy and Ann Ault, to our regular quiz master Billy Ault, to Mandy, Fiona and Jo for a well-received hot supper and to Stoke Fruit Farm for their continued sponsorship of this event. The Raffle was organised by our Explorer Scouts and raised £348 for their expedition to Kandersteg in the Swiss Alps in July 2013 for which they also organised a Table Top Sale in the Scouts Headquarters and a Supermarket Bag Packing session.

Our Book Sales, held twice a year, are considered to be amongst the biggest and best in the area with over 8,000 books on sale, all sorted and classified, and at very reasonable prices. Our book sales this year raised over $\pounds1,300$. Thanks to all those who helped in sorting, selling and other essential tasks.

Our fundraising appeal for a Transport Fund was formally closed this year having reached a total of $\pounds 8,000$. We are grateful to those retailers who have supported this appeal with collection boxes as well as those individuals and organisations who generously gave us donations. We purchased a medium sized trailer during the appeal and the remainder of the fund will now cover on-going costs for the servicing and maintenance of our trailers, training of drivers for E licence entitlement for towing heavier loads and purchase of additional trailer(s) when required.

We also received donations throughout the year in appreciation of assistance at various local events as part of our community support programme. For example, we helped again with the set-up of the Businessmen's Club Annual Barbecue. The Explorers provided car parking support at the VW BeachBuggin event in Southsea in August at very late notice and the organisers were delighted how our Scouts carried out their duties. They also sold balloons at the Northney Farm Open Day as well as organising the car parking, cooking the BBQ, helping in the tea rooms, managing the queue for tractor rides and running a tuck shop.

At the end of this Annual Report you will find a table of individuals and organisations that have supported us in various ways. These contributions are vital in funding and managing our activities throughout the year and we very much appreciate their support.


