Chairman's Report

Birthdays can be like 'Marmite' - you either love them or hate them. In 3rd Hayling Scout Group, we absolutely love them, especially Big Birthdays such as 85 years. They give us the opportunity to let our hair down and have a real party. We even design and produce a badge for every Scout and Leader to wear - not just for one day but for a whole year.

Details of the celebrations for our 85^{th} birthday up to the 31^{st} March 2014 can be found in this year's report. Later activities will be issued next year. Behind all the fun and activities, it is important to remember that Scouting on Hayling has thrived and grown, despite the dramatic changes that have taken place over the years since 1929. Think of Hayling back in those early years - we had a wooden and somewhat rickety toll bridge for vehicles, a steam railway between Hayling and Havant, the Royal Hotel to provide sumptuous seaside holidays for visitors, a cinema etc. These have all gone or been replaced - but 3^{rd} Hayling Scout Group remains as strong as ever.

In the pre-war years, the Group used to meet in a wooden YMCA hut in Elm Grove and camped in huge, heavy and leaky bell tents. We moved to the present location in the 1940s - but it was still a wooden hut with very basic facilities. Today we are very proud of our substantial brick-built 'Headquarters' (still affectionately known as the 'Scout Hut' by some) with facilities previously unimaginable in those early years such as central heating, fully insulated roof with no leaks, LED lighting, showers, broadband internet, etc. Our equipment store contains not only the familiar and trusty Nijer patrol tents but also a range of lightweight tents and an adaptable marquee. We also have archery and rifle shooting equipment with our own fully trained instructors. But one thing hasn't changed - that is the basic values of the Scout Movement such as leadership, helping others, team work and the development of young people to become responsible citizens. At the same time, we make it fun and enjoyable - especially when there is a birthday to celebrate.

As Chairman, my task is to ensure that the Leaders have the necessary facilities and finances to perform their very important role. My Group Development Team (GDT for short) consider both short term and longer term needs or wishes. Sometimes we have to react quickly to an urgent problem - for example, several years ago, the original asbestos roof was leaking badly but we were able to initiate a fundraising campaign and complete the installation of a new and fully insulated roof in less than 12 months. More recently, we were running out of space due to the increasing size and number of Sections in the Group - so we converted the rooms at the rear of the Headquarters into a large and modern second hall, named the Day Hall, as it was funded through a legacy from Irene Day.

In the last twelve months, storage facilities have also been addressed and we now have bespoke shelved storage areas, cupboards etc. to ensure that equipment is easily accessible and protected. Thanks in particular to GDT members Andrew Harrison and Peter Goddard for their handyman skills, as well as a team of Leaders and helpers who sifted through, thinned out and sorted an array of materials and equipment accumulated over decades! We have also been able to landscape and pave the ground at the rear of the Headquarters to make it suitable all year round for activities such as cooking and firelighting. This project was supported by a donation from Hayling Island Lions Club and we thank them for their continued interest and support of Scouting on Hayling.

Transporting equipment for camps and activities is a major requirement and our transport project initiated two years ago focussed on the use of towed trailers. As a result, we now have a 'fleet' of trailers including three box trailers and two open trailers, managed by our GDT member Clive Allgood. Not forgetting also a group of willing helpers who offer to use their vehicles for towing.

As the largest Scout Group in Hampshire, our financial turnover exceeds £45,000 and we have to manage our finances in a professional manner with audited accounts and reporting our activities annually to the Charities Commission and the Scout Association. Our Treasurer Mary Pike has done a fantastic job in converting our account management and banking arrangements into a very effective and computerised system.

This year, we have also completed a project to produce a 3-year financial review using an Excel spreadsheet, thanks to the computer skills of our GDT member Pete Rowson. This document identifies in detail the various types of expenditure and the predicted increases or decreases over the next three years. It is a 'live' working document which is regularly updated and will enable us to budget more accurately and make informed decisions of the income required from sources such as subscriptions, gift aid, fundraising etc.

This year I was surprised and honoured to be awarded the Bar to the Silver Acorn by the Chief Scout. Whilst this is a personal award, I see it as a recognition of the success of Scouting on Hayling by a fantastic team of Leaders and helpers, led by our Group Scout Leader, Ian Hawke. I simply enjoy being a part of this dynamic organisation that has one simple but vital role - the development of our young people to give them a good start in life - as it did for me when I was a Scout 'a few years ago'!

I would urge any if you who want to have a bit of fun and enjoyment, than come and talk to us about the wide range of activities we can offer you - maybe just helping at a single event to get a taster or an hour or so every week as a helper. If you would like to join our Development Team, please don't hesitate to contact me or Ian Hawke. We can always find a suitable role to suit your skills or interests.

Group Scout Leader's Review

One of the challenges of a very large Scout group such as 3rd Hayling is to minimse the unintended chaos and disruption caused when we arrive anywhere. For example each April when we arrive at the Church for St George's Day Service in two double-decker buses which has now become our required level of transport, or when 120 Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers arrive at Thorney Island Army base for a fun day.

Once we managed to get everyone onto the base, those taking part had an amazing day of activity, much of which was along the traditional lines of Scouting, but the location and support we received from the Army meant that we also had some unusual things to try out.

These group based events are important. They not only allow us to pull our resources together for a day or weekend of activity, but also allow the younger members of the group meet and work with the older sections – and in our case a chance for the Leaders to get to know each other better!

There are many ways to measure the success of a Scout Group. Some are numbers based, for example:-

- Over 1200 nights were spent in camp
- 39 Top Awards were presented along with nearly 1500 activity and challenge badges
- Over 250 different activities on offer across all age ranges
- 120 members in uniform, on two double-decker buses arrive for St Georges Day.
- 130 take part in a brilliant fun day with some novel activities

However the real test is "do our young people keep coming back". The formula for this is very simple. Great programmes with a balance of Fun, Adventure, Challenge and Achievement. Just take the time to read the individual section reports and I am sure that like me you will be amazed at the innovation, inspiration and imagination of the Leadership teams to make this happen.

During the year we have said goodbye to Emma (Redwood Beavers), Nikki (Shark Troop), Dave (Maple Beavers), and Liam & Rob (Lion Troop), but at the same time welcome Libby, Chris and Adam (Shark Troop), Becky C (Jupiter Pack) and the return of Becky H (Saturn Pack) and Abi (Nexus Explorers), although Abi is about to leave us for the next phase of her life working with school children brining a combination of adventure and conservation to their lives.

Thank you for your support to Scouting on Hayling and you leave with our best wishes for your futures. Of course if you ever get bored in the evenings, I am sure Hayling or any other Scout Group would be more than happy to hear from you!

After many years, Mandy Hawke has decided to step down as leader of Saturn Pack, but remains as part of the group as Assistant Group Scout Leader and also providing support guidance to our Young Leaders. Mandy has also taken on a District Appointment supporting new adult leaders into Scouting. I know Mandy's enthusiasm and organisation will be missed but she has left really strong foundations and I know with the new team the Pack will thrive.

One of the nice parts of the GSL role is to visit our sections when holding camps and sleepovers. It is great to see the young people having fun, without the need for television and computer games and usually trying something different. It is also amazing how often the same activity can be used for all ages, often with a twist to make it a bit more challenging. Duplo is a perfect example of this, when often all that varies is the height of the tower or bridge and the weight it must support as part of the challenge.

Camping continues to be an important part of Scouting and an activity that differentiates this movement from other organisations. During the past year our Scouts have been to Hayling Island, Broadstone Warren (East Sussex), Braggers Wood (Dorset), Devon and Switzerland. The younger sections have made use of the facilities we have access to on Hayling Island and also Rowlands Castle.

The Young Leader scheme has really developed on Hayling over the past 3 years. This provides an opportunity for those aged between 14 and 18 to work with the younger sections and also complete 11 training modules relevant to this work. Mandy Hawke coordinates this within the group, working with the young leaders and also the section leaders to ensure that we offer the appropriate opportunity for development and achievement. This is vital for Scouting in the future as these are our potential Leaders in the years to come.

Last year we were using our new "Day Hall" and during this year we have continued to make changes to the HQ to improve storage and hence the management of our equipment. Peter Goddard our Quartermaster estimates the total value of our camping and activity equipment to be in excess of \pounds 25,000 which is why the management of it is so important. Andrew Harrison has continued to carry out a number of building tasks for cupboards and shelving and we spent a good weekend in the Easter Holidays checking everything we had for serviceability and also took the opportunity to dispose of items that we no longer required.

None of the above would happen without the enthusiastic and dedicated team of adults who continue to give freely of their time each week. The planning of programmes and activities, the weekly meetings, the camps and sleepovers, the working weekends for the HQ and the support given by the leaders to each other is without doubt the reason why Scouting on Hayling continues to be so strong. I would personally like to thank every Adult Leader and Helper who make this all possible.

Underpinning all of the work of the Leaders is our Group Development Team led by Phil Blosse. It is easy to say that their role is to ensure that the Leadership have the equipment and facilities they require to deliver fun Scouting, but of course this covers a diverse range of activity. Fund Raising, promotion, maintenance, planning and innovation are all part of the combined characteristics from this small but willing team of people and I know that their efforts and successes are well respected by the Leaders. As you will see from her report, Mary our treasurer is now managing accounts that involve a turnover in excess of £45,000. I always find this a very frightening number and means that we have to be very professional in our planning and management of money. Mary provides the necessary control, but always with a positive view that the Leaders should have what they need to provide the excitement to their members. Peter Rowson has spent time this year developing a simple but effective spreadsheet to help with our budget planning.

Our prime income continues to be from Subscriptions and Gift Aid and the control of these provided by Karen Wells and Kim Lovegrove means that we maximise the opportunity provided by this income stream.

So, to all of the GDT and the many others who help to support the Leaders in their roles – a huge thank you.

So, what about the next 12 months?

Our number one priority will continue to provide safe exciting Scouting that offers a good balance of fun and achievement to the Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers in the group. To achieve this we always have to look at what we offer and what we can offer. This places demands on our Leaders and also our Group Development Team and therefore we need to ensure we remain totally flexible and to utilise the skills and time people have to offer. This in turn will have an impact on what we can do, the timeframe in which we can do it and what financial support is required.

Finally, I would like to say a huge thank you to our Chairman Phil Blosse for his tireless efforts in moving the group forward and especially to Mandy who puts up with my endless visits to the HQ, or Phil or wherever this great movement takes me.

It is very appropriate that both Phil and Mandy were recognised in the Scouting St George's Day Awards with the award of the "Bar to the Silver Acorn".

Treasurer's Report

Income for the year again exceeded £45,000, including the cost of camps and expeditions which are shown in the accounts under the "Money Exchange, camps and trips" line items.

Our objective is that the income from subscriptions should cover the cost of the annual capitation to Scouting HQ, section running costs, books & badges, Leader training and specialist equipment and 75% of the HQ costs (Insurance, Utilities and Maintenance). We are currently behind in this objective and will review what action, if any, needs to be taken during our November Executive meeting.

Our main income sources continue to be Subscriptions, Gift Aid and Fund Raising, with the latter providing an income of nearly £6000. It is, as a direct result of these events and other generous donations that our annual subscription at £90 remain below that of many other groups and well below that for many other organisations and hobbies.

We continued with the fitting out of the "Day Hall" and thanks to a generous donation from "The Lions Club of Hayling" were also able to complete the landscaping of the area behind the HQ.

My thanks to Karen Wells for managing the subscriptions across the group and to Kim Lovegrove for dealing with Gift Aid and to Chris Driscoll for auditing our accounts. At this time, these accounts are unaudited, but I am sure the draft represents a true summary of our financial affairs.

We have been offering Young Leader training in the group for about 3 years. It has seen some truly remarkable young Scouts taking on the challenge.

This is a big commitment, as it requires attendance at weekly meetings at one of the sections in addition to monthly training sessions at the Scout HQ to do the modules. There are 12 modules. These consist of planning three indoor and three outdoor activities.

Taking part in three planning sessions as well as taking responsibilities for a particular aspect of the section running- this might be running the tuck shop, ensuring cleaning of floor after the meeting and many others that the section leaders think appropriate to help manage the section.

The monthly meetings are about an hour and half long where we cover leadership skills and styles, programme planning, how and why we have games, child protection, communicating appropriate to the age group and how to manage challenging behaviour as well as a full first aid course. As you will see a very comprehensive training that adequately makes sure the young leaders have the correct skills to be part of the leadership team. Fund Raising Report

Our Scout Group has always aimed to keep subscriptions as low as possible so that every child has the opportunity to join 3rd Hayling Scout Group without financial concerns dominating that decision. This policy has been even more important over recent years with many families feeling the squeeze on costs and income from the government's austerity measures.

In this context, fundraising and financial support from various sources plays a vital role and I am pleased to report that we have had another good year, thanks to the invaluable help from helpers, parents and local organisations.

One important component in our approach to fundraising has been to offer some form of service or material benefits to those who part with their cash in support of our cause. The Christmas Card Delivery Service very much reflects this 'Service to the Community' and continues to be well supported and appreciated by the local community. This year we delivered over 5500 cards, which raised £1000, thanks to the efforts of many parents and their children, as well as our 'postmaster' Ian Hawke.



The Annual Quiz Night, which has its own unique format, proved to be very popular again, aided by our perennial quizmaster Billy Ault and adjudicators Ann and Eddie Ault - and not forgetting the rustic Scout food at the interval provided by Mandy, Fiona and Jo and her team. The quiz, won by the 'Mad Hatters', raised a total of \pounds 570. In addition, a raffle was organised by two Scouts, Dominic Allgood and Craig Cooper, who have been invited to represent Hampshire on two International expeditions in Japan and Iceland respectively. The Scouts must raise their own money for these expeditions which also involves a period of Service to the local communities. They raised \pounds 270 from the raffle for their fundraising campaign.



Our Book Sales, held twice a year at the URC Hall, have again provided an important source of income and the profit from the June and November sales was ± 391 and ± 460 respectively. In addition, we offer local book sellers a preview of our books by special invitation and they provided an additional and somewhat exceptional total of ± 1510 , thanks mainly to a one-off spend by Albert Road Book Shop of over ± 1000 which will not be repeated.

We were aware of increasing costs, especially van hire, and the substantial effort needed to move 8000 books to and from the URC Halls. So in February we experimented with a 4-day book sale in the Scouts HQ. I have to confess to being highly sceptical of the chances of financial success - even as the instigator of this new approach. How wrong I was proved to be. We more than doubled our profit to £1200 and the effort was substantially reduced.

Most importantly, the sale brought buyers into the HQ where they could appreciate the resources and activities of the Scout Group. At the same time, the atmosphere during the book sale was delightful - quiet (almost like a library), never crowded and opportunity for helpers to talk to and assist buyers, aided by refreshments. As a result of this successful experiment, we will now hold future book sales in the HQ and increase the frequency to three per year at each half term. We now project an annual income of £3500 to £4000.

I must thank Jill Adams of the URC for all her support over the years in supporting our book

sales and providing the maximum availability of hall time on Fridays for setting up the books. It would not have been possible to hold the sales without this support.

In May, we organised a duck race in which 1000 sponsored ducks were released into the Hermitage Stream in Havant with a prize of an e-reader



for first past the line – as well as a consolation prize for the sponsor of the poor lonely duck finishing last! Much fun was enjoyed by those attending and the event raised \pm 700. The event was organised by our Explorer Section to raise funds for their expedition to Switzerland.

Throughout the year, we provide assistance at various local events as part of our community support programme. For example, we provide marquees and tables, assist with car parking, help with the set-up of events such as the Businessmen's Club Barbecue, Northney Farm Open day etc. We do not expect financial reward for this community programme but are always grateful where donations are made in appreciation of our help.
