Colin Vaughan 1932 - 2014







Colin was involved with Scouting on Hayling Island for over 70 Years as a Cub, Scout, Senior Scout and Rover Scout. He was one of a unique few who completed the requirements of the "King's Scout Award" but was presented with the "Queen's Scout Award" due to the change of Monarch in 1952.

Colin was an active Leader from the age of 20 as a Scout Leader and Group Scout Leader until he stood down in 1991. He retained strong links to Scouting as a member of the District Fellowship, as a Vice President of Havant Scouting but always maintained an active interest in Hayling Scouts, attending meetings and events whenever he could.

In 1989 at our 60th Birthday camp (centre above) Colin was awarded with the Silver Wolf, the personal gift of the Chief Scout and the highest award that can be received by an adult in Socuting.

He was recently presented with his 60 year Adult Service Award, during which time he made a positive contribution to the lives of thousands of young people.


It was a real privilege for me to have been involved with Colin in Scouting on Hayling.

Chairman's Report

The Scout Group certainly took the opportunity in 2014 to celebrate enthusiastically 85 years of Scouting on Hayling, with the highlight being the Group Family Camp in June. Camping has always been, and I am sure will continue to be, one of the features attracting young people to Scouting, with simple activities such as cooking their own food over an open fire - and then eating the burnt offering, even though they probably wouldn't even touch it at home! But when parents and family join the camp, it takes on an extra special significance. The true fun and enjoyment of camping becomes evident to the whole family and for some parents who have not been involved in Scouting in their younger years, it can be quite a revelation - in a very positive light. It also gives parents the chance to behave, quite unashamedly, like children! But you don't have to wait until the 90th birthday celebrations to enjoy the fun because, as you can see from this Annual Report, there are so many fascinating activities taking place every week in the various Scouts Sections.

The birthday celebrations didn't stop us continuing to improve the facilities for our Leaders so that they can carry out their very important role. My Group Development Team (GDT for short) consider both short term and longer term needs. We have completed most of the improvements to the storage facilities and have started redecorating the internal areas to give them a fresh look. Some of the camping equipment has been replaced or supplemented, and we now have a fleet of four trailers to provide the vital transport facility for camps and other activities. We even had a 'decluttering weekend' when we discovered that many items had been kept in store, thinking that they might be useful at some time in the future, but had never seen the light of day for many years. So it was time for a good clear out, which also had the benefit of making valuable space for actively used items.

The new Day Hall has made it possible this year to move the secondhand book sale from the URC Halls to the Scouts HQ. The sales take place during every school half term week when the Sections do not meet. This move not only reduced costs and effort but also allowed us to hold the sales over four days instead of just a Saturday morning and the end result was a doubling of our profit. Additionally, when the public come to the HQ, they see our facilities and get a better understanding of what Scouting today on Hayling is all about.

One sad piece of news this year was the death of Colin Vaughan who had been involved with Scouting on Hayling Island for over 70 years as a Cub, Scout, Senior Scout, Rover Scout and then a Scout Leader. He was one of only a few Scouts who completed the requirements of the "King's Scout Award" just before the death of King George VI in 1952, but was actually presented with the "Queen's Scout Award" on the accession of our present Queen. Colin was an active Scout Leader from the age of 20 and later became Group Scout Leader until he stood down in 1991. He retained strong links to Scouting as a member of the District Fellowship and Vice President of Havant Scouting yet, even after retirement, maintained an active interest in Hayling Scouts, attending meetings and events whenever he could. I felt privileged to be asked by his wife Gillian to deliver the eulogy to

Colin at his funeral. He set a very high standard of Scouting on Hayling and we will continue to maintain this standard, as reflected in the activities and achievements presented in this Annual Report.

Although the Annual Report is primarily intended to show historically what has been achieved over the last twelve months, we also like to give some insight into future plans for the Scout Group over the next three to five years. With that in mind, we are currently planning a major refurbishment of the kitchen which will be of great benefit to the Leaders and I am sure there will be other important changes in the next five years. What should always be retained, however, are the basic values of Scouting that for more than 100 years have helped in the development of our young people to give them a good start in life.

My thanks to so many people who have contributed to another successful year and we look forward with enthusiasm and optimism to the future of Scouting on Hayling.

Group Scout Leader's Review

"Its so we can run around like teenagers and get away with it". This is the phrase I and others will use when responding to the question, "why do you do this Scouting thing?".



The proof was clearly demonstrated last June when we descended on the Lyons Copse camp site near Shedfield for our 85th Birthday Camp. Even the parents camping with us, realised that they could safely take part and noone would else would care!!

It is also amazing how you can capture the imagination of all people, young and old. The truth is that the activities are very similar each time, but the story line can create some amazing ideas to change the theme. This time, the Vikings had all of the Explorers building their Viking ship (see front cover), deciding what dress code their ship required and then deciding how best to ensure everyone (including themselves) ended up soaking wet! And who ended up with the biggest grin - a Leader of course!





The hard work put in by the Leaders and support teams for these events is always rewarded by the feedback and also knowing that each young person taking part has had the opportunity to try something new. We always encourage everyone to take part and have a go, because normally once they have done it once, they realise that we are all "mad". And of course we always go home tired and happy - although this young Cub had not even left the field before he was asleep!!



These events, independent of how much fun and enthusiasm they generate are not in themselves the reason why 200 young people on Hayling Island turn up to Scouts each week. It is the efforts of the Leadership teams across the 10 sections that provide the programmes of fun, adventure and achievement that really count.

Hayling is very lucky in having such strong Leaders even though circumstances often mean that some will move away or have to take a break for other reasons. During the past 12 months we have said goodbye to Mick Balch, Stef Rosam, Sylvi Rigden and Jake Whistlecraft. Thank you to you all for your contribution to the success of our Group and remember if you ever get bored........ During the same period we have welcomed Sarah Bailey (Saturn Pack), Dan Easom-Taylor (Saturn Pack), Francine Shaw (Redwood Beavers), Kinnett Mears (Jupiter Pack) Leigh Hunter (Nexus Explorers), Karl Ward, who joined as a Cub and is now a Leader with Nexus Explorers and to Wolf Clostermann, who had never tried Archery before the Group Camp and now is on the way to becoming an Archery Instructor. Martin Tyler has also offered to help us with our senior Scouting and Duke of Edinburgh awards. Thank you all for coming forward and I hope your time with us will be both enjoyable and rewarding.

During the year:-

- Over 2000 nights were spent in camp (and sleepovers), on Hayling, at our Birthday camp at Lyons Copse and as far afield as the Normandy Beaches in France.
- 42 Top Awards were presented along with 1500+ badges
- 8 Young Leader Belts were awarded to recognise an amazing commitment for those aged 14 to 18, completing training in 11 areas plus helping at one of the younger sections for periods of over 18 months.

However our real test is "do our young people keep coming back". The formula for this is very simple. Great programmes with a balance of Fun, Adventure, Challenge and Achievement. Just take the time to read the individual section reports and I am sure that like me you will be amazed at the innovation, inspiration and imagination of the Leadership teams to make this happen.

Every Leader and Helper deserves our fullest praise for the outstanding contribution they make to the lives of so many young people.

Each year the turnover of our Group seems to grow. In the year 2000, the income was £14,000 (plus £9000 from Camps and Expeditions), in 2009 it was £19,000 (plus £11,000) and this year £30,000 (plus £13,000).

The management of these sums requires a very professional approach from our Treasurer, a job made more complex with 10 sections to track (and I know that we do not always provide the correct information at the appropriate time!), as well as the overall financial management of the Group in terms of the building and equipment.

Mary does an outstanding job for us and never fails to amaze me with her knowledge of the detail and control she provides to keep us honest. The help she receives from Karen (subs coordination) and Kim (Gift Aid) is really appreciated and collectively these roles help ensure that the Group Development Team, under the Leadership of Phil Blosse are successful in one of their main aims - "To ensure the Leadership have the equipment and facilities they require to deliver fun Scouting. The aim, however simple to state is not so straight forward to deliver and covers a broad and diverse range of actions.

Fund Raising, promotion, maintenance, planning and innovation are all part of the combined characteristics from this small but willing team of people and I know that their efforts and successes are well respected by the Leaders.

It is often the small ideas that seem to make the largest impact:-

 Last year Phil Blosse decided to try using the HQ for our Book Sales to make savings on hall and van hire and to significantly reduce the effort in moving 8000+ books up and down the Island. What he had not considered was the considerable increase in income, the simplicity introduced for sorting, the reduced need for people to help at the sale and that the visitors seemed to enjoy visiting the HQ and recognised that the sale was for the benefit of Scouts on Hayling.

- James Perfett for some time had been suggesting we introduce effective shelving in the container located to the rear of the HQ. Pete Goddard took control of this and not only did this mean that the equipment stored was much more accessible, but somehow he found additional space to store many of the tables and benches that previously occupied the stores.
- Linda Hunter who for some time has managed the craft equipment for the Group, proposed that we re-organise the Leaders Den, sorting out what is stored and giving all items a clearly labelled location. So, after the St Georges Day Service we spend a couple of hours in the Den and the results are amazing.

These 3 simple ideas have not only helped us all, but have also generated other potential improvements that can be made.

It is the innovation that exists across the whole Leadership and Support teams that continue to help Scouting on Hayling move forwards - and long may it continue.

Finally, I would like to say a huge thank you to our Chairman Phil Blosse for his tireless efforts in moving the group forward and especially to Mandy who puts up with my endless visits to the HQ, or Phil or wherever this great movement takes me.

Treasurer's Report

Income for the year again exceeded £43,000, including the cost of camps and expeditions which are shown in the accounts under the "Money Exchange, camps and trips" line items.

Our objective is that the income from subscriptions should cover the cost of the annual capitation to Scouting HQ, section running costs, books & badges, Leader training and specialist equipment and 75% of the HQ costs (Insurance, Utilities and Maintenance). We are slightly behind in this objective and will review what action, if any, needs to be taken during our November Executive meeting.

Our main income sources continue to be Subscriptions, Gift Aid and Fund Raising, with the latter providing an income of nearly £6000. It is, as a direct result of these events and other generous donations that our annual subscription at £90 remain below that of many other groups and well below that for many other organisations and hobbies.

The past year has seen far less expenditure in both equipment and HQ activities although during the next financial year there are some key projects planned, including the replacement to our Kitchen to bring it in-line with today's Health and Safety requirements for public use buildings, the replacement to our Marquee Roof sections, now showing their wear after 15+ years of high level use and the replacement of other camping equipment again after many years in service. As Pete our Quartermaster points out, our camping equipment is in use most weekends from May until September and at many other times throughout the year.

All of these are accounted for thanks in the main to very generous donations from Gillian Vaughan, The Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes (Hayling Branch) and Andrew Harrison.

My thanks to Karen Wells for managing the subscriptions across the group and to Kim Lovegrove for dealing with Gift Aid and to C. N. Clarke for auditing our accounts. At this time, these accounts are unaudited, but I am sure the draft represents a true summary of our financial affairs.

Nexus Explorer Unit

What an amazing year we've had. Following on from our group camp at Lions Copse themed on Vikings, our challenge as explorers was to build a Viking ship and defend if from being attacked. So we set about thinking how to construct a Viking ship. Throughout the year we have been up to fires cooking eating more fires & cooking camping, sleep over's in the HQ night hikes swimming cycling even playing with Duplo.

Our next year will see us camping in hammocks & spending our summer camp sleeping in shelters made with natural materials found around the camp site and cooking all meals using more fire.

We are also planning a 2 week expedition to Switzerland in August 2016.

Bethan, Will, Ben, Nathan, and Matt are continuing to help with their section. Karl has taken out a full leader appointment now he is 18 and is helping with Explorers.

It is great to have Young Leaders in the sections as they are an inspiration to our younger members; as well as their young legs being able to play the games with lots of energy!

There are ten more young people undertaking the training at this time.

Fund Raising Report

The primary sources of income for the Scout Group are the membership subscriptions that we receive from parents together with gift aid that we are able to claim from these subscriptions. This source of income covers our main expenditures such as insurance, gas, electricity, water etc. as well as the membership fee that we have to pay to the Scout Association for every member of the Scout Group. This income, however, does not cover capital expenditures for camping equipment, improvements to our Headquarters and other special items. In this context, fundraising, donations, grants and other sources of income play a vital role in ensuring that our Leaders have the necessary resources to carry out their important roles.

I am pleased to report that we have had another good fundraising year, thanks to the invaluable support from helpers, parents and local organisations. We have been able to fund various capital expenditures without increasing subscriptions which we have held constant for the last two years.

One very encouraging contribution this year came from the Waitrose Supermarket in Havant. We were chosen in January 2015 to be one of the local charities to be nominated for their green disc fundraising scheme which awards £1000 every month. Three charities are nominated and we were delighted to be informed that Hayling Scout Group had received the largest share of the green discs from customers, namely 42%, representing a donation of £420. This donation will cover the costs for much needed lightweight tents.

As mentioned in last year's report, our book sales are now held every half term over four days in the Headquarters and this has proved to be very successful by reducing costs and increasing sales to achieve an annual profit of over £3000.

The Annual Quiz Night, which has its own unique format, proved to be very popular again, aided by our perennial quizmaster Billy Ault and adjudicators Ann and Eddie Ault - and not forgetting the rustic Scout food at the interval provided by Mandy, Fiona, Jo and her team. The quiz, won by "Quid Nunc" (which is Latin for someone who wants to know the latest news and gossip), raised over £550 profit.



The Christmas Card Delivery Service continues to be well supported and appreciated by the local community, especially as we have held the price of a stamp at 20p for a first class service! This year we delivered over 6000 cards, which raised over £900, thanks to the efforts of many friends, parents and their children with deliveries, as well as our 'postmaster' Ian Hawke and the Explorers who do the collection and sorting.

We also received a very generous donation to fund an upgrade to the kitchen in the Headquarters with stainless steel fixtures and other improvements and the layout is

currently being discussed by the Leaders. The new kitchen will be a great asset and help the Leaders to focus on the favourite subject of our young Scouts - FOOD.

Throughout the year, we provide assistance at various local events as part of our community support programme. For example, we provide marquees and tables, assist with car parking and help with the set-up of events such as the Businessmen's Club Barbecue, Northney Farm Open day etc. We do not expect financial reward for this community programme but are always grateful where donations are made in appreciation of our help.

Finally, this year we were very saddened by the death of Colin Vaughan in 2014 who contributed so much throughout his life to the success and high standards of Scouting on Hayling. His wife, Gill, nominated Hayling Scout Group as one of the organisations to receive donations at his funeral. As Colin was always keen to encourage camping, we felt that an extension to our marquee would be a very appropriate, well used and lasting item in memory of Colin's service to Hayling Scout Group.

At the end of this Annual Report, you will find a table of individuals and organisations who have supported us in various ways. These contributions are vital in funding and managing our activities throughout the year and we very much appreciate their support.

As you can see, we had a very varied and interesting fundraising year. We will continuously assess our needs and sources of funds to ensure that our growth and high standards can be maintained for the years to come.


